God Greet You!

I received your loving letter and also the pretty birthday card and I was delighted. Many thanks to you for it. But I can't really be so satisfied with the letter because you didn't answer any of the questions which I put to you in my second last letter. Mother has one of the Mueller girls from Willowie. I haven't heard anything yet as to how they are getting on, since I haven't seen any of my folks since I came here. I plan to go down and visit them at Pentecost; down on Saturday with the Mail and back again on Monday. I have heard that they now have a young German schoolteacher in Appila.

You wrote that I have quickly lost my keen interest in dress making. I would gladly have stuck with it, but if one doesn't earn enough to put salt on one's bread, one should really lose interest. So I have sewed very little. When I first came up [North] everyone had sewing for me to do, then I could have liked to have 10 hands. Later I would have liked to lay my hands in my lap and let my debts go hang; I sure had enough of them.

That's why I accepted this position. I still like it very well. She has never once scolded me; it's like home to me. I never go out alone, only accompany her when she goes. Last Wednesday afternoon we went a little way up the 'Mount' [Mount Remarkable]! It's nice to be able to look out over the surrounding's from up there. By now I also know my way around a bit in the shop; I really like it there. You can see that life is not very hard for me by the fact that whereas I only weighed 130 pounds when I left Appila I now weigh 142. That's a good sign. I never have to rise before 7 except on wash days.

You ask whether Richard still has no bride. Not as far as I know. And there's nothing doing with me either; Paul should not rejoice too much just yet. Zilm has written me two letters, the second was even more lovely than the first. So I asked Gothold to write to tell him that at present I don't want anyone. So I don't know whether he has written again or not. (I would have been stupid.)

Last time I heard, mother is quite a bit better now, she drives to Laura almost every week.

It is very dry. On 24 April we had a thunderstorm but no rain. On the 26^{th} we had a nice rain, but by bow it is really dry again. This evening it looks a lot like rain, we hope we get some.

I guess you'll be busy seeding now? What are you all doing now; are you all fit and well? And how's your baby doing; is he good? What's his name and who were his sponsors? Have Have you seen Anne Joppich? What are the Ebenezer folk up to now – are there a lot of weddings? Is Lydia Dallwitz married yet? I don't know no other news so I'll close in the hope that these few lines reach you in as good health as they have left me.
